

'Alliance of Necessity' Can Never Solve Our Problems

The recently established 'alliance of necessity' between the two major opposition parties — the Pakistan Tehreek-i-Insaf and the Pakistan People's Party — fell apart on Wednesday when their leaders traded allegations of corruption against each other and ruled out the possibility of any alliance between them in future.

Comment:

A fully fledged working democracy is the goal of PTI Chairman Imran Khan. Each action of his is done with the aim of fixing the system and to make it a realization.
